Development of Highland Forest

May 1, 1974 - Date of Incorporation of Highland Forest. The initial Board of Directors included Stanley E. Maples, Roy E. Maples, Ray Knittel, Carl Rollins and Joseph Tuggle. The Incorporator was Macro Properties Corp. The link to the Articles of Incorporation in the Highland Forest website is below:

1976 - 1977 - The 1st tennis court was built and the Pavilion was constructed.

September, 1976 - Country Way stopped at Charolais.

1977 (?) - Loftwood construction was started and Country Way was extended to Arbor Trail

1977 - 1978 - Country Way was completed. Nob North Drive off Country Way stopped at the entrance to Nob North golf course.

1980 - Construction stopped for 2 years in Highland Forest because interest rates went up. Stan Maples and his uncle, identified as Macro Properties (located in a trailer where the Citgo gas station on Cleveland Highway is now), owned property that is now Highland Forest. Because of the interest rate increase, the property went to banks. One of the banks selling lots to individuals was Decatur Federal.

The HOA purchased the pear trees along Country Way.

March, 1980 - The Highlands Garden Club was founded. See the Highlands Garden Club section below for details.

1986 - Randy Cook bought 50 acres off Loftwood - 50' down Loftwood

1986 - Mark Fidler bought property east of Country Way

1986 - 1987 - Scouts cleared the path around the pond. The HF HOA paid for the construction of the walkway around the pond.

1987 - 1988 - Mark Fidler and Randy Cook agreed to build the 2nd tennis court.

The fence was installed around the tennis courts.

From the April, 1990 Highland Highlights:

We will have a new neighbor, Clark Lunsford, on Nob North Drive. He is moving a 50-60 year old Victorian House, **The Dull House**, formerly owned by Natalie Dupree, of New Southern Cooking, from Atlanta. The board has reviewed his plans and are confident that this will be an attractive addition to our neighborhood.

The April, 1990 Highland Highlights included:

The first Annual Highland Forest Mixed Doubles Round Robin Tennis Tournament will be Saturday, May 26 and Sunday, May 27 - Memorial Day Weekend.

1990 - 1991 - Golf View and Tee Top were developed.

Before Golf View was developed, resident children played in the area called the **Gullies**. The children enjoyed this area (Driver Lane) because of the hills and valleys. When construction equipment was brought in to develop the properties, 2 of the boys poured sugar into the fuel tank of one of the pieces of equipment to delay taking away their play area. The boys were identified and the parents paid for the damage to the equipment.

The April, 1992 Highland Highlights included:

Under Board Bits: A **new drinking fountain** will be installed between the basketball and tennis courts.

The June, 1992 Highland Highlights included:

On June 1 a large number of residents met at VUMC to discuss priority issues facing all persons in Highland Forest. Security and police protection along with our ability to adequately fight fires in HF are two major concerns that must be addressed. One option discussed was **annexation into the City of Varnell**, presented by the Board and Lindsay Metcalf, Mayor of Varnell. Three main points will be investigated by this Board:

1. Possible incorporation of HF as an entity in itself.
2. Possible grant application for funds to modify our lake for improved water source through Whitfield Co. vs application through city of Varnell - estimated cost \$50,000.
3. Formula used to determine tax dollars appropriated to city of Varnell should HF annexation take place.

40% of residents were represented, leaving 60% to be contacted directly by Board members.

Once this is computed, a report on the overall attitude towards annexation in HF will be presented.

The April, 1993 Highland Highlights included:

The HF Pool Association Annual Meeting scheduled for March 15th was canceled due to the **“Blizzard of 93”**. The meeting has been rescheduled for April 19th.

The August, 1993 Highland Highlights included:

An **Adult Pool Party** has been planned for August 27th from 8:00 pm until 12:00 midnight. Hors D'oeuvres and soft drinks will be provided. The party will be centered around a Beach theme with several fun activities such as Volleyball, limbo contest, Best Man and Woman's Beach Outfit and a Door Prize. A disc jockey will be playing all your favorite oldies (and some). The cost is \$4.00 per person and must be remitted to one of the following: Leslie Shelley, Christy Bradfield or Holly Easterling.

The **October, 1993 Highland Highlights** included:

The new Highland Forest **Car Decals** were distributed throughout the neighborhood a couple of weeks ago. We appreciate your cooperation in displaying these decals in the back window of your vehicle - all this in an effort to ensure the protection of HFLA residents.

The **May, 1994 Highland Highlights** included:

The **Young Adults' Social Committee** has planned a Pool Party for the young adults of HF (Young Adults - defined as high school graduate through 25 years of age) on June 11th.

Upcoming Events: 7/4 - Putt-Putt Golf, Fireworks, Movie; 7/23 - Whitewater Rafting

The **June, 1994 Highland Highlights** included:

Start cleaning your closets. We are planning our **first annual Highland Forest Garage Sale**. It will be held on Saturday, August 20th.

The **January, 1995 Highland Highlights** included:

The Highland Forest Adult Social Committee would like to invite all residents to participate in the **Progressive Dinner** to be held on Saturday, February 25th. Plans are being made for all residents to meet at one house for Hor D'oeuvres; divide into groups and disperse to another house for dinner; leave the dinner house and meet another group at another house for dessert; then everyone meet back at one house for after-dinner drinks and a time of socializing. The Social Committee asks that each couple contribute a side dish, salad or dessert. Cost of the evening will be \$5.00 per person. This charge will cover set-ups, Hor D'oeuvres, bread, wine and other needed items.

The **March, 1995 Highland Highlights** included:

There were approximately **60 people** who participated in the February **Progressive Dinner** and all seemed to have a wonderful time. It was a great way to meet new faces and chat with some more familiar ones.

The **August, 1996 Highland Highlights** included:

The Adult Social Committee has planned a **Polynesian Luau** to be held Saturday, 9/7. The cost is \$12 per person, 21 and older only. The Luau will be held at the Pool. A feast of catered Polynesian cuisine will be served along with dessert, exotic drinks, soft drinks and setups. To add to the mood, lanterns, candles and music will be provided.

The **January, 1997 Highland Highlights** included:

The Social Committee has **planned activities** for the year:

Feb 22 - Mardi Gras Party
April 26 - Progressive Dinner
May 31 - Pizza Party at the pool
July 4 - Picnic
August 5 - Ladies' coffee
September 6 - Polynesian Luau
December 8 - Ladies Salad Supper and Ornament Exchange

The **March, 1997 Highland Highlights** included:

The **pool deck** is being completely redone and enlarged. Both the baby and big pool are being resurfaced.

The **October, 1997 Highland Highlights** included:

From the President: The **HFLA Membership Activity Card** is on its way. The card must be in your possession and displayed upon demand while utilizing HFLA property. HFLA patrol will ask to see cards. Anyone who is not recognized as an HFLA member and fails to display their card will be asked to leave immediately. New signs around the lake, as well as those posted around our other common areas, are being prepared. All signs will include the demand to display a membership card upon request.

The **December, 1997 Highland Highlights** included:

At the Annual meeting a recap was given of some of the **major things accomplished** this year: new grate at the bar-b-que pit, repair of the slide at the playground, new signs around the pond and common area, community activity cards, new contract for landscaping and replacement of the wind screens and benches at the tennis courts.

The **February, 1998 Highland Highlights** included:

Thirty people attended the Board of Commissioners meeting on January 13 including from Highland Forest. The result was the ruling from the meeting changed the property in question **from General Commercial to Neighborhood Commercial**. We came very close to having areas near to us zoned General Commercial. This would detract from the value of your property investment. The issue may be open for discussion again in six months.

The **December, 1998 Highland Highlights** included:

At the Annual meeting some items were discussed: A thank you was expressed for pursuing and accomplishing the **stop signs at the corner of Charolais and Country Way**; new picnic tables have been installed around the lake; working on increasing lighting in the common areas.

The **July/August, 1999 Highland Highlights** included:

The new **playground equipment** has been installed and is ready for play; The **sidewalk** is complete along Country Way; (?) the **entrance sign in front of the tennis courts** is complete except for the landscaping- the large tree will be moved behind the sign and the fence removed; construction of the **entrance sign on Nob North Drive** is scheduled to start soon.

The October, 1999 Highland Highlights included:

Highlands Garden Club voted at their September meeting to place a marker next to the Dogwood Tree that was planted in memory of charter member **Ellie Trimble**.

2000 - Construction was approved for the **Highland Forest sign on Nob North Drive** off Cleveland Highway.

The Highland Forest **Country Estates Sign** was originally built in the middle of Country Way near the top of the hill entering Highland Forest (just below the intersection of Upper Varnell and Country Way).

The **January, 2007** Highland Highlights includes: "For those wondering about our **damaged entrance sign on Country Way**, the person that had the accident has insurance and estimates have been taken for repair. We hope we have it done sooner rather than later, but most stonemasons are very busy."

Because of such accidents, the sign was removed and reconstructed on the side of Country Way by the tennis courts.

The July, 2000 Highland Highlights included:

On June 5th the Landowners Association held a general meeting. Our association president, Jeff Riddlegarger, presented a proposal, from Aquatic Resources, for **fixing the lake**. They stated the lake does not need to be dredged. They recommend:

1. Cleaning out the sand bar that is in the north end of the lake.
2. Replacing the spillway with a more efficient one. The current spillway at the south end has holes in the pipe which is causing the water level of the lake to drop. The proposal was approved by the membership.

The November, 2001 Highland Highlights included:

Now the Canadian geese are not the only ones who can enjoy the lake. The **walking path around the lake** is complete. It is six-tenths of a mile if you go all the way around.,.

The February, 2002 Highland Highlights included:

A memorandum from Rick Brown about **amendments to the Bylaws** adopted at the November, 2001 annual meeting:

1. The amendment that was adopted specifies that "the annual meeting of the members will be held on the **second Tuesday of November** of each year at 7:30 p.m. at a location to be determined by the Board of Directors.
2. **Term of office for the Directors:** The amendment adopted changed so that the Directors will not hold office for a two year term. The effect is to stagger the terms of the members of the Board of Directors so that each elected Director serves a two year term and no more than three Directors stand for re-election in any given year.
3. **Quorum requirements at the meetings:** The original Bylaws required that a majority of the members of the /association be present at a meeting before any business could be transacted. The section of the Bylaws containing this quorum requirement was deleted.

As the Bylaws now stand, business can be conducted by those members who are in attendance at the meeting and a majority vote of those in attendance is sufficient in order to transact any business.

The **August, 2002 Highland Highlights** included:

Changes to the Lake: **40 grass carp** have been added to the lake to help with the vegetation problem. If any of these fish are caught, please return them to the lake - they won't help if they aren't there. **Two water fountains** have also been added for beautification and to help oxygenate the water. Also, we are trying to **share the lake with the geese**, however, they are smarter than we thought, so please be patient till we find a way to live with them.

The **May, 2004 Highland Highlights** included:

The HFLA and HFPA (Pool Association) have met to discuss the **merger of the two associations**. Advantages would include the combined ownership of the land around the lake. The HFPA currently owns the land between the two bridges, Country Way and the lake. The HFLA owns the remaining land around the lake. Combined ownership would facilitate improvements around the lake to make our community better.

The **December, 2004 Highland Highlights** included:

If you haven't noticed yet we have a **new stop sign** on Country Way and Honeysuckle Ln.

The **September, 2005 Highland Highlights** included:

Labor Day Weekend Picnic and Fireworks: The fireworks and cookout will be held on Saturday, September 3rd.

The **July, 2007 Highland Highlights** included:

The following provided by Dan Williams which responds to a question from Bill Harris in June as to why there are piles of rocks at Upper Varnell and Country Way:

"The **rock mound** at Upper Varnell Road and Country Way is a corner marker. There is another one hidden by the pines on the west side of Country Way. When Macro Property, the original developers, bought the land there was not a right of way off of Upper Varnell Road. **They purchased a right of way from the Hayes family that owns all the land to the east of Country Way as you enter the subdivision.** When Macro built the sign that used to be in the middle of the road, they also had the corners for the right of way marked with these rock mounds showing where the corners are."

The **May, 2007 Highland Highlights** included:

The **Highland Forest Country Estates sign** is now **rebuilt** at the south entrance on Country Way.

The **March, 2007 Highland Highlights** included:

The **Neighborhood Watch** patrol has come to an end. In **1993** Neighborhood Watch included 2-hour periods of a volunteer resident driving around the community checking for suspicious activity. If any were found, the police were called.

The May, 2008 Highland Highlights included:

Board reported that someone **took all the tables and benches out of the pavilion and threw them in the lake**. Also, there has been loud and profane music in the park and those playing basketball were causing disturbances. Options:

1. Residents call the Sheriff's dept or Varnell police to remove unattended visitors.
2. Hiring a security guard
3. Installing access gates at the 2 entrances
4. Closing the entrance to the basketball and tennis court parking lot
5. Installing new signs with the rules and that this is private property
6. Requesting the country to convey all of the streets in the neighborhood allowing the creation of a Gated Community
7. Approach Varnell to discuss annexation of the pool and park areas for patrolling.

The April, 2009 Highland Highlights included:

A big thank you to all the Highland Forest neighbors that helped our family in the search for the **robber of our home** on Wednesday, March 18,2009. The Watson and the Corte families were relentless in their search for the red Ford Ranger and in helping with getting the information known in the neighborhood.

The June, 2009 Highland Highlights included:

In the Cherokee language, the word **Cohutta** means “poles of the shed”, referring to the mountains (poles) that hold the sky (roof of the shed).

The October, 2009 Highland Highlights included:

Allen Crow has done HF lawn care for over 10 years. He was tragically killed while cutting trees at his family church. He was with his dad and brother at the time doing voluntary service. Allen had much to do with making our park what it is today. He always made sure that the lawn looked good for the weekend and holidays. He was very caring, always fair and honest. Whenever we needed something done, Allen always responded - like pulling a couple of picnic tables out of the lake, painting light poles, laying stone along the dam and so many other things over the years. His business will continue but Allen will be sorely missed!

Mark Fidler built the 1st 4 houses on Nob North Drive just off Cleveland Highway

2010 - Mark passed away and the Fidler Park sign was installed.

The September, 2011 Highland Highlights included:

Letter from the President: We had a pretty **major fish kill** occur in our lake last weekend. This usually occurs in connection with weather patterns that cause unusually low levels of oxygen in the water. Our lake is very shallow, especially on the north side, and we have had difficulty keeping our fountains functioning properly. The lake probably needs to be dredged in places to remove excess silt deposits though cost will be a major factor on when this could be done.

The **April/May 2012 Highland Highlights** included:

Highland Forest Junior and Adult Sprint Triathlon - May 19, 2012

You'll start your event with a swim in the clean aerated lake of Highland Forest, then bike and run through some of the most beautiful country in North Georgia. The bike leg will be on the open back roads of Cohutta, GA. Highland Forest is one of the oldest and most recognized neighborhoods in Whitfield Country and their homeowners association is 100% on board and ready to support this great event.

The **February, 2014 Highland Highlights** included:

From the Annual Meeting: A **lot study** was completed to assure all assessments are correct. There were questions as to the fact that some owners have multiple lots but only pay for one assessment. The findings were that there are 350 lots in the neighborhood and the breakdown on ownership is as follows:

4 are government owned

49 are vacant lots

44 have multiple owners

270 single dwelling lots

The end result and recommendation was that 1 lot should have 1 assessment.

The **September, 2014 Highland Highlights** included:

We are very excited to announce the launch of our new website - highlandforestonline.com.

Please check out this new site and click on the links for get the latest news.

The **December, 2015 Highland Highlights** included:

Highland Highlights will be going completely digital in 2015. Beginning with the January, 2015 edition of the Highland Highlights, we will no longer mail paper copies. The newsletter will be available on our website or via email.

2018 - 2019 - The Mulligan Drive cul-de-sac was developed.

2021 - The Annual Meeting at VUMC included the **first broadcast to residents over the Internet.**

May, 2022 - A Wilson **Pickleball net and posts** were approved by the Board and installed on the tennis court nearest Country Way. The previous Pickleball net has been moved to the south end of the tennis court.

May, 2022 - The **two pool pumps** are to be replaced. The plan is to create a 2nd water connection in 2023 so that maintenance can be done to a single pump without taking the system down.

Golf Tournaments

Nob North Golf Course belongs to the City of Dalton. It opened in **July, 1978.**

Gary Player came to the area to design the golf course.

In the beginning, Jerry Kyer and David Noll, Sr, would drive around putting Golf tournament notices in the mailboxes of HF residents. Besides the green fees paid to Nob North, the cost to residents was \$5 for drinks and food afterwards.

Initially there were 2 tournaments per year; later increasing to 3.

The tournaments only allowed HF residents or family or guests who lived >100 miles away.

Because, at the time, Nob North would not allow one person to make multiple tee times, housewives would meet at Nob North to get tee times for the tournament.

1986 - 1987 - HOA began contributing to the golf tournaments

July 27, 2002 - A Highland Forest Golf Tournament was held costing \$40 per person - Select Shot format. There was a Cookout after the tournament at the Picnic Shelter - "Bring your own"

2005 - Golf Tournaments were held August 20 and October 15.

A document from **2011** lists golf tournaments in April, August and November.

In **2013**, Jerry discontinued organizing the golf tournaments. James Gordy and Lee Smith took over.

2020 - The most recent Highland Forest golf tournament was held.

Highland Forest Pool

1978 - 10 - 12 Residents guaranteed the money to build the pool.

1979 - The HF Pool opened. Those residents who wished to join the pool paid \$500 initially to join the pool and an annual fee afterwards. The Pool was separate from the HOA.

1979 - The old Pool house was first used. It was demolished in 2019 for the construction of the new Clubhouse.

Initially, John Ramsey organized and had training for lifeguards.

11/19/12 - In a letter to residents from the Board: On September 18, 2006, the Highland Forest Pool Association was dissolved and the ownership of the pool was transferred to the HOA. After that, a pool committee operated the pool and separate dues were charged to be a member of the pool. The Board recommends that the pool and homeowner membership be combined.

At the **2012** Annual Meeting, the combination of pool and homeowner dues was approved.

Fireworks and the 4th of July

1980 - Jerry Kyer, David Noll, Sr., and Ken Beudoin started the fireworks displays on the 4th of July. They would drive to Sweetwater, TN and each pay ~\$70 for fireworks.

Later, Jerry continued to organize the fireworks displays with volunteers.

Beginning in 1986, Jerry bought fireworks from Arvil Sailors at Arvil Fireworks just over the TN state line toward Cleveland.

1986 - 1987 - The HOA started contributing to the purchase of fireworks.

Those who helped Jerry included Kevin Kyer, Mac Carson, C.S. Lee and Tom Haddock. Jerry built sturdy platforms so the vibrations from shooting the fireworks would not cause them to roll over. It normally took 8 to 10 individuals an hour to load and remove the tape from the wick so the wick would be easy to find and light. Jerry would have 6 to 7 people lighting the fireworks while he was getting the next group ready. The group working on the fireworks normally did not see much of the display because they were working to light the next group. The clean up the next day involved picking up thousands of small pieces of exploded paper.

Jerry continued working with volunteers with the fireworks displays for 32 years and stopped in **2013**. In the following years, the HOA hired an outside company to conduct the fireworks.

One year Jerry Kyer and others roasted a pig at the pavilion for the 4th of July. Residents could pay \$5 for barbecue and sit in the pavilion area to watch the fireworks. Later, because of liability concerns, those watching the fireworks were no longer allowed in the pavilion area.

Clubhouse Process

In the **July, 2007 Highland Highlights**, 2 letters were included in a Special Notice to All Highland Forest Landowners: 1 from Nelson Conger explaining reasons why a new Clubhouse should not be built and 1 from the HFLA Board listing reasons for and against the construction of a new Clubhouse. A Special Called Meeting to vote in person or by proxy was planned for July 5, 2007.

The **August, 2007 Highland Highlights** included a notice from the HFLA Board: "On July 5 a special called meeting occurred to discuss the possibility for the construction of a community building near the pool. A project like this requires a yes vote by two-thirds of all homeowners to pass. Proxies were sent to all homeowners asking for a vote. The final vote did not carry and no community building will be built. Thank you to all those who participated."

2019 - The Board sent a survey to determine the priorities of residents for the community. Approximately 130 responses were received. The #1 response was: replacing the pool house followed by dredging the lake (~\$100k - ~\$200k) and improving the playground.

The Board contacted other HOA's to get ideas on the new Clubhouse and was advised to have no long term debt and not to raise assessments.

The determination was to have 1 special assessment. To reduce the special assessment, the following were used: 2 CD's were cashed, \$20k in the Capital Outlay budget was used along with carryover funds. After requesting and reviewing bids, the bid from Hollis Holdings (Jerome Hollis) for \$308k was accepted.

The Board hired an architect (Sherwood Jones) and put a Resident Design Team together to design the Clubhouse.

A special meeting of residents was called to present the plans and budget for the new Clubhouse. Those attending voted to approve the budget of \$308k for the Clubhouse.

The Special Assessment of \$695 per property was determined by dividing \$308k (minus other funds) by ~340 houses . \$236k was raised from Special Assessments.

A Clubhouse Committee was set up to establish the rules for using the Clubhouse. The guidelines from several other HOA's were reviewed.

December, 2019 - The process of obtaining permits was begun.

2020 - The old pool house was demolished and the new Clubhouse built by Jerome Hollis. The first gatherings took place in the new Clubhouse in early summer.

Highlands Garden Club

The **2002-2003 Highlands Garden Club Yearbook** included:
Friendship is always in bloom at Highlands Garden Club.

The membership roster included **18 members**.

Club Aim: The object of this organization shall be to stimulate the knowledge and love of gardening among amateurs, to aid in the protection of native plants and birds and to encourage beautification of our area.

Membership: The membership of this club shall be unlimited. Residents of Whitfield County shall be eligible for membership.

Club Flower: Wild Azalea

Dues: Annual dues shall be \$12.00.
